

- Give everyone a chance to speak
- Respect the ground rules
- Respect each other

Ground rules

- Speak openly and honestly
- Listen carefully and respectfully to each person
- Keep comments brief and stay focused on task
- Explore differences respectfully and look for common ground
- Trust that the facilitator has the best interest of the group at heart
- Silence cell phones
- Be respectful of the opinions of others




What is your GENDER?



Answered: 63 Skipped: 1




What is your Ethnicity? MARK ALL THAT APPLY



Answered: 62 Skipped: 2




What is your AGE?




What is your AFFILIATION? Check all that apply






When comparing treatment of community members by law enforcement, do you believe that people of color are consistently treated less fairly by law enforcement officers than are white people?

If you answered yes, frequently, or sometimes, do you believe that law enforcement officers can change their behavior to consistently treat people of color fairly?






Have your **opinions** changed as a result of this dialogue?






Do you think that the process of dialogue is beneficial in addressing important issues in our community?









Do you believe that people of color are consistently treated less fairly by law enforcement officers than are white people?












If you discussed **gun violence** in your group, was the discussion helpful?

What I mean by that is, based on the name of the school I assumed we were dealing with children in a disadvantaged circumstance (gang-riddled neighborhoods based on the officer demographic) who were fortunate enough to be accepted into a special school that would offer them a safe haven and a chance to focus and stretch their talents and abilities lest they become one more statistic. (Would you say I've been watching too much tv?)
